Chad Savage

Prior to teaching environmental science at Westminster, Chad Savage taught at both the Cottage School in Roswell, Georgia, and the River Ridge Environmental Education Program. Savage was born in Cleveland, Tennessee, and was drawn to teach at Westminster by the evident desire of the student body to improve the conditions of the society around them.

"[I came to Westminster] in order to join a collaborative and creative group of colleagues and students that show a great desire to engage with the ommunity around them to create positive change," said Savage.
